Dear Parents / Carers

The exam season is well underway with not only GCSE and A level exams, but internal exams for other year groups as well. It is how students perform in exams that is the measure of how well they have succeeded at school. This is becoming increasingly true as the reforms to the exam system see a reduction in the amount of controlled assessment students will be doing and an increase in the number of exams. The current Year 11 is the first year group not to have to do controlled assessment in GCSE English for over 30 years. In the next few years, controlled assessments will disappear from many subjects with only a few such as PE, Technology, Art and Performing Arts retaining them. This means that the ability to memorise large amounts of information and perform well in exams is becoming increasingly important. Students need to learn how to revise and remember information. This is why the internal exams in Years 7-10 are so important in helping students learn how to prepare for exams and to give them the experience of working under the pressure of exam conditions. As a school we are adapting our teaching and learning strategies to help students develop the learning skills they need to be successful in this new exam system.

However school isn't just about passing exams. School is also a place that allows students to take part in new experiences and develop their confidence and skills which will help them be successful when they leave school. As usual there have been a whole range of activities taking place at Caldew since the last Headteacher's Bulletin. Year 7 are taking part in the Archbishop of York's Young Leaders Award by organising charity activities, the School Council have been busy fundraising, Drama performances have been staged and our various sports teams have been taking part in competitions including the athletics team who have qualified for the next round in the National Championships.

News

School Funding

I am sure you have seen the various media reports about the state of school funding. Since 2010/11, school funding has reduced in real terms by 14%, most of this due to a decline in funding for 6th Form students. Whilst it is true that the Department for Education is spending more money on education than ever before, this is solely due to an increase in student numbers. Costs for schools have also risen significantly over a number of years, most of which are beyond the control of schools such as increased pension and National Insurance contributions. The financial future for all schools is uncertain as we wait to see the outcome of the National Funding Formula consultation. However, I am sure that funding will remain difficult for the foreseeable future and this will create challenges for schools both across Cumbria and the rest of the country. I want to reassure parents and carers that we are working hard to do all we can to protect the high standard of education we aim to offer to our students.

As a result of these funding pressures we have made two changes to our charging policy for next academic year. From September there will be changes to our charges for music tuition. These changes have been explained in a letter sent out to those students affected. We are also introducing a charge of £5.00 for DT materials for students in Years 7-9. This charge will cover the cost of materials used to make products in Graphics, Textiles and Product Design and will allow students to take their products home. If you do not wish to pay this cost then your child will still be able to make the project, but the materials will be recycled and used again by the DT department. This is a charge that other schools in the area make and we have set the cost below most of these schools.

A separate letter will explain this in more detail. We are sad that we have to make these changes and I understand it puts extra pressure on families. However I hope you understand the reasons why we have felt the need to do this.

Caldew Friends and Family Association



Student Safety – Front of School

We recently spoke to students in all year groups about how they were finding life at Caldew and what we could do to improve things for them. One of the things which came to light from our discussions with students was their concern about the traffic at the end of the school day, especially the number of cars parked outside the school making it difficult for them to see clearly when crossing the road, and the speed of some drivers. The School Council have asked for this message to go in the bulletin:

"Please could parents not rush to pull out into the road as we, the students, might be trying to cross. It often feels like a racetrack with the speed some of the cars are being driven. We will ensure that we follow the Green Cross Code and THINK! Education (road safety guidelines) but we ask that you do the same. It is important for us to feel safe in, and on our way to and from school."

As we are all aware, the road outside the school gets very busy at the end of the school, however as I am sure everyone will agree the safety of our students is paramount. Please do not park directly on the road outside the school. There is a car park a very short distance away in Dalston where you can wait for your child. Please can you also be mindful about the speed at which you drive. Many thanks for your cooperation in this matter.

Attendance Matters

Caldew School attaches great importance to our work on improving school attendance in line with targets set by both the Local Authority and the Government.
